Why Do Catholics Celebrate the New Year?

We are beginning the Year of the Lord 2022. The marking of the dawn of a New Year is no secular holiday because time and history have been drawn into the coming of God into the world. We keep track of our time as either BC (Before Christ) or AD (Anno Domini) to demonstrate that Christ is the center of history, the one through whom we judge all that came before and is going to come. New Year's teaches us how properly to measure time, how to mark the coming of salvation into the world in light of its progressive unfolding in our lives and in human history. St. Paul tells us further that "from this relationship of God with time there arises the duty to sanctify time."

We mark the progression of time as an opportunity to reflect on our own lives in relation to it. Where do we stand within God's plan for history? How can I immerse my own life into God's coming into the world? How can I allow God to shape my own life in time, and, through me, to shape history?

It is not a coincidence that we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary. The Holy Mother of God is a feast day of the Blessed Virgin Mary that celebrates Mary's motherhood of Jesus on January 1st. We close the Christmas octave — the eight days following the birth of Christ — with a day honoring Mary as the Mother of God. This is usually a holy day of obligation, but since it falls on a Saturday in 2022, it is not this year. "Mary, the all-holy ever-virgin Mother of God, is the masterwork of the mission of the Son and the Spirit in the fullness of time. For the first time in the plan of salvation and because his Spirit had prepared her, the Father found the dwelling place where his Son and his Spirit could dwell among men. In this sense the

Church's Tradition has often read the most beautiful texts on wisdom in relation to Mary. Mary is acclaimed and represented in the liturgy as the 'Seat of Wisdom.'" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 721)

"With his Mother's flesh God clothed himself, / Since from Virginity He was made man."



The Mother of the Redeemer goes before us and continually strengthens us in faith, in our vocation and in our mission. By her example of humility and openness to God's will she helps us to transmit our faith in a joyful proclamation of the Gospel to all, without reservation. In this way our mission will be fruitful, because it is modeled on the motherhood of Mary. To

her let us entrust our journey of faith, the desires of our heart, our needs and the needs of the whole world, especially of those who hunger and thirst for justice and peace, and for God.

In celebrating the Solemnity of Mary Most Holy, the Holy Mother of God, the Church reminds us that our Mother, more than anyone else, received this blessing. In her the blessing finds fulfillment, for no other creature has ever seen God's face shine upon it as did Mary. She gave a human face to the eternal Word, so that all of us can contemplate Him.

Lord, we ask for your wisdom, for your strength and power to be constantly present within us. We pray you would make us strong and courageous for the road ahead. We ask you to bring us closer to you each day through Mary. Give us ability beyond what we feel able, let your gifts flow freely through us, so that you would be honored by our lives, and others would be drawn to you. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

As I write this reflection, I am reflecting on my homily for the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday. The prayers, Sacred Scriptures and songs all dealt with JOY. I want us to begin the New Year 2022 with JOY! Everyone was saying at the end of the year 2020 that 2021 was going to be better. Well, it sure did not seem so. It appeared that 2021 was worse than 2020 and it does not look like 2022 will be any better; at least in the eyes of the world.



For me, one place that I have seen JOY and experienced it myself, is during the Sacrament of Penance. I cannot tell you the number of times I have seen people who come in, weighed down with sin and all that it does to keep us distant from God and then at the absolution, the change that occurs; JOY has returned. All is well with their soul and are reunited with God, the Church and their neighbor. I see that when we obey God's commandments that are the ways to love God and to love our neighbor, there is JOY. In doing what God has asked us to do, as a good parent would do for their child, God tells us to do His Will and we will find JOY. When we do our own will, we do not find JOY. We end up falling into unhealthy forms of pleasure. The devil lies to us and tells us that we will find JOY in doing what we find pleasurable. Sadly, what we find pleasurable usually is sinful, especially when we over-indulge in the things of this world. By obeying God and dying to self and taking up our crosses, we will find JOY. The paradox that the world cannot see or give is that in giving ourselves to God, we find JOY. The world cannot understand that denying oneself of anything is going to be joyful. Doing whatever one wants and getting the most "toys" during one's life is what will bring us joy. In reality it only gives us pleasure and it does not last. In God we find our JOY!

Here are some quotes from the Saints on JOY. They are long, but they can tell us more about JOY than I could ever do. I am still a work in progress and I am striving for JOY.

Saint Ephrem: "In Your sacrament we daily embrace You and receive You into our bodies; make us worthy to experience the resurrection for which we hope. We have had Your treasure hidden within us ever since we received baptismal grace; it grows ever richer at Your sacramental table. Teach us to find our JOY in Your favor. Lord, we have within us Your memorial, received at Your spiritual table; let us possess it in its full reality when all things shall be made new."

Saint Augustine: "O Lord, the depths of a man's conscience lie exposed before Your eyes. Could anything remain hidden in me, even though I did not want to confess it to You? In that case, I would only be hiding You from myself, not myself from You. But now, my sighs are sufficient evidence that I am displeased with myself; that You are my light and the source of my JOY; that You are loved and desired. I am thoroughly ashamed of myself; I have renounced myself and chosen You, recognizing that I can please neither You nor myself unless You enable me to do so."

Saint Gregory the Great: "What follows is reason for great JOY: *'Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.'* There is here a particular reference to ourselves. We hold in our hearts One we have not seen in the flesh. We are included in these words, but only if we follow up our faith with good works. The true believer practices what he believes. But of those who only pay lip service, Saint Paul says, *'They profess to know God, but they deny Him in their works.'* And Saint James adds, *'Faith without works is dead.'*"

Saint Anselm: "My soul, have you found what you are looking for? You were looking for God and you have discovered that He is the Supreme Being, and that you could not possibly imagine anything more perfect. You have discovered that this Supreme Being is life itself, light, wisdom, goodness, eternal beatitude, and blessed eternity. He is everywhere and He is timeless. . . . O God, let me know You and love

Develop a More Powerful and Effective Prayer Life

Here are seven ways to improve your prayer life in the new year.

1. Know to whom you are speaking. Prayer is a conversation with God, and every conversation begins by addressing the person to whom you are speaking by name. Jesus begins with “Our Father in heaven.” He focuses on a distinct person — the Heavenly Father with whom He has a personal relationship. We share the same right to call God “Father,” and there are times when we need to talk with our Abba Father, Daddy God. But God is three distinct persons in One: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

2. Thank him. A heartfelt thank you is always a great conversation starter. Like any parent, God loves to see that we have grateful hearts. But more importantly, as we take the time to praise God for all He has done in the past — the answered prayers, the impossible situations overcome, the healings and grace — our faith to believe for even greater answers to prayer grows stronger and more confident. Praise opens the gates of heaven and should always be part of our alone time with God.

3. Ask for God’s will. The Lord’s Prayer is not the only place where Jesus role-modeled a heart of obedience and submission to the will of God over his own desires and needs. In the Garden of Gethsemane, only hours before Jesus’ crucifixion, He would once again pray, “not my will, but yours be done.” In a world where right and wrong are frequently confused and the future is so uncertain, it can be hard to know how to pray or what to ask for when difficult circumstances arise. But the one thing we can know with absolute certainty is that God’s plan for those who love Him is

good, and the safest place we can be is in the center of His Divine Will.

4. Say what you need. In Jesus’ time, bread was a staple — one of the most basic needs of life — and He did not hesitate to ask God to provide it. But we often hesitate to bother God with the little things we need, thinking He shouldn’t be bothered. And when the big problems come, we try everything we can to solve the problem before we think to pray. The Bible says, “You do not have because you do not ask God.” So never hesitate to ask God for what you need in 2022. Your Father in heaven delights to give you good gifts.

5. Ask for forgiveness. James 5:16 reminds us that if we want our prayers to be heard, our hearts need to be right with God and with one another. If you feel your prayers are bouncing off the ceiling, take some time to check your heart.


6. Pray with a friend. There is power in agreement when we pray in Jesus’ name. When you have an urgent need to take before the throne of God, call a friend to pray with you. If you don’t already have one, make finding a trusted prayer partner one of your goals in 2022.

7. Pray the Word. Jesus did the same when He was tempted by Satan in the wilderness (see Luke 4:1-12). He was the Son of God, but He did not use His Divine authority. Instead, He used the authority of the Scriptures. The most important key to a vibrant prayer life is to understand our spiritual

authority in Christ as explained in the Scriptures. The only way to do that is to become intimately familiar with the Bible. Even a few minutes a day in the Word of God will add strength and authority to your prayers in 2022.

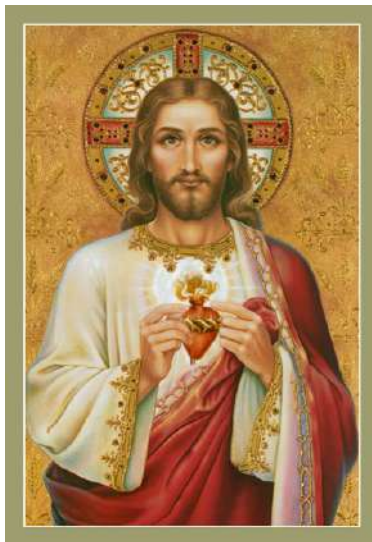

Take a Stand

Jesus' name is known far and wide, but as a word with which to swear profanely, His name is blasphemed. Take a stand against taking the Lord's name in vain. Turn the channel, turn off the television, or walk out of the movie theater when you hear God's name taken in vain, which has become all too frequent. Vow never to take the Lord's name in vain. Make reparation immediately if you accidentally do or if you hear someone else do so. How can you make reparation? One way is to have this perfect aspirational prayer "Admirable is the name of God." That prayer of praise for the Holy Name of God given to Sr. Marie of St. Peter is also a prayer of reparation for blasphemy. Adopt the pious practice of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus. If only souls knew the riches of just uttering the Sweet Name of Jesus with reverence and wonder, and the happiness which that Name brings to souls so disposed.

The month of January is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus. "In the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those that are in heaven, on earth and under the earth" (Phil 2:10).

Christ's name is chosen in heaven, and the Angel Gabriel announces it when he informs the Blessed Virgin of



the incarnation: "Behold thou shalt conceive in thy womb and shalt bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call His name Jesus". It is a name that has marvelous implications, for it means "savior." The very name speaks the magnitude of His mission, His infinite love, a love that will cause Him to offer Himself up for us. The name of Jesus is the sweetest of all names, and He who bears it is most worthy of all love. He who calls Jesus his friend can be assured that this friend is the most devoted and unselfish of all friends. Jesus is our all. In His name we may pray to the Father with assurance of being heard. In His name the Church administers all her sacraments. In His name she offers all her prayers and blesses homes, the fields, and the sick. In the name of Jesus she casts out evil spirits, and at the hour of our death bids us, "Go forth, Christian soul." She assures us that whoever calls upon this name will be saved. When our soul has departed this life to seek its eternal home the Church asks in the name of Jesus, "Eternal rest give unto him, O Lord."

O GOOD JESUS, according to Thy great mercy, have mercy on me. O most merciful Jesus, by that Precious Blood which Thou didst will to shed for sinners, I beseech Thee to wash away all mine iniquities and to look graciously upon me, a poor and unworthy sinner, as I call upon Thy Holy Name. Therefore, O Jesus, do Thou save me for Thy Holy Name's sake. Blessed be the Most Holy Name of Jesus without end. Amen.

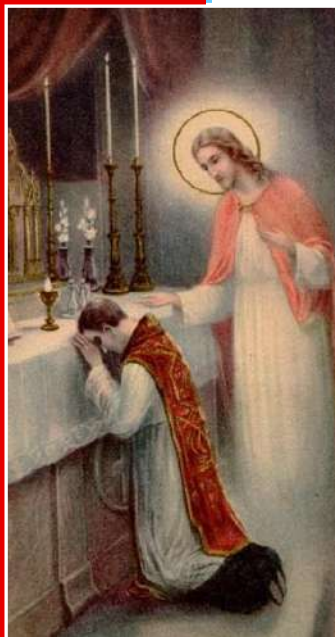
Prayers for the Supreme Court
