He Has Risen! We Have Risen With Him!



Now that the Easter Season is upon us, let us take time to reflect on the extraordinary and undeserved gift we have received through Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection — our sins have been forgiven and we are now sharers of eternal life with Christ. Even though we celebrate Easter once a year, it is not intended to be a once-a-year event in our lives. We should continually reflect on Jesus' resurrection and experience more deeply our own risen life in Christ on an ongoing basis.

Just think, because of what Jesus Christ accomplished through his passion, death, and resurrection, our Heavenly Father has "delivered us from the power of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." (Colossians 1:13-14) If you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. (Romans 10:9) If we really believe in our hearts what we profess with our lips, then not only has Christ died and been raised to life for us, but we too have been crucified with him. In Christ, we have died and have been buried, and on the third day we too have been raised to life again in him.

How do we know this? Isn't this what these Scriptures tell us? The Lord desires to transform each one of us into his image and likeness, so we can live out the new life he won for us. Unfortunately, we are sinners and so we all have obstacles that can get in the way of doing this, including: past hurts, wounds, memories, disappointments, impatience, anger, intolerance, wanting to be in control, judgmentalism, negativity, self-centeredness, self-love, and selfishness.

No matter where we are right now in our walk with the Lord, no matter what issues we have in our life: Christ's victory over sin and death is our victory. Christ's risen life is always available to us. Jesus is true to his name. Jesus is "Immanuel": God with us. Jesus will never leave us or forsake us. Let's ask the Lord for the grace to live out these Easter truths every day of our lives. He Has Risen, Alleluia! We Have Risen With Him, Alleluia!

Reflect the Risen Christ!

“Those who went to San Giovanni Rotondo to attend his Mass, to seek his counsel or to confess to him, saw in him a living image of Christ suffering and risen. The face of Padre Pio reflected *the light of the Resurrection.*”

As I write this reflection, the war in the Ukraine continues. The darkness of sin, of hate, of evil still continues in our world. One nation attacks another nation. The darkness of suffering, fear, injury and death moves forward as if the Risen Christ did not rise from the dead. The Light of the World is hidden, but not extinguished. Jesus' death brought light and life.

At the Easter Vigil, the most solemn of Masses for the Catholic Church, the Paschal Candle is brought into a darkened church. The only light is from the candle. We proclaim three times, in the darkness: *Lumen Christi* [Light of Christ] and then the darkened church begins to fill with light as the church glows with the light from the Paschal Candle to the candles held by each individual. This *Lumen Christi* is a reflection of our receiving the Light of Christ at our baptism. We were promised by our parents or by ourselves if we were baptized as an adult, to be enlightened by Christ through our life's journey, by being taught our faith through words and actions. Our lives were

promised to become reflections of Christ in our world. We reflect both the Resurrection and the Death of Jesus: The Paschal Mystery.

In a letter to his Spiritual Daughter, Raffaolina Cerase, Padre Pio writes in greeting: “*May the Holy Spirit fill your soul with His most holy gifts and make you holy. May the risen Jesus make you, too, feel a spark of His holy love and reveal more and more to you the mysteries of the Cross. May the sorrowful Virgin obtain for you from her most holy Son true and sincere love of the cross and may your soul be inebriated with it. Amen.*” (April 10, 1915)

Easter is not Easter without Holy Week. Christ “showed himself the Priest, the Altar, and the Lamb of sacrifice.” (Preface V of Easter from *The Roman Missal*) The Victor had to first be the Victim. As Bishop Fulton Sheen said: “*Unless there is a Good Friday in your life, there can be no Easter Sunday.*” All this is to help us to Rejoice in the Risen Lord. It is to help us find joy again in the midst of suffering, the carrying of our cross. If our world was always one filled with joy, we would begin to take it for granted and eventually we would lose its meaning. Suffering takes joy away, but it also makes us joyful again when the suffering is gone. As the fourth verse of the Lenten song *Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days* states:

Abide with us that when this life
Of suffering is past,
An Easter of unending joy
We may attain at last.

The Joy of the Risen Christ is revealed through Jesus by stating that he is the Light of the world, a light that dispels the darkness. He overcomes sin and death. He enlightens us to follow the narrow path to Heaven. He fills us with His Wisdom, an enlightenment through knowledge of Him through His Bride, the Church. All this is done so that we may reflect the Risen Christ in our world and to those who live in the shadow of death. He guides us on the way to peace. Just as every day of our life is a Lent, at turning away from sin and believing the Gospel; we also are to reflect the Risen Christ dispelling the darkness of sin, every day of our life. This is only done through Christ.

Reflect the Risen Christ!

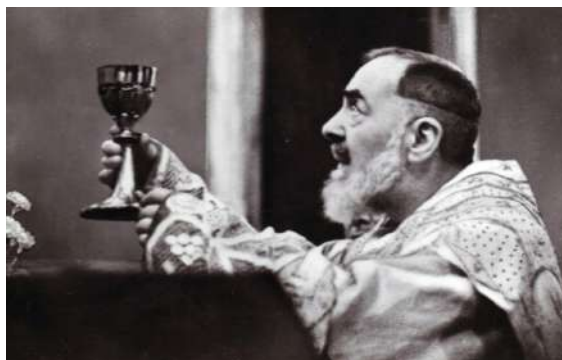
An Easter Miracle

Padre Pio pronounced Paolina Preziosi, who was a local woman in San Giovanni Rotondo, to be such a good person that she had no faults in her soul. In other words, she was fit for heaven. One Lent, the saintly Paolina suddenly became seriously ill with pneumonia. It was 1925: and the fact that there was no penicillin available meant that Paolina's infection was life-threatening. The doctors despaired and said that Paolina would die soon. Paolina's husband and their five kids went to Padre Pio. Two of Paolina's children wept and tugged at Padre Pio's brown habit. He was aggrieved by the children's sorrow. He promised to pray for their mother – and for them – and he said, “tell Paolina to have no fear – since she will be resurrected with Our Lord.”

On Good Friday, however, Paolina fell into a coma. This made people question what Padre Pio had said – was he really serious when he said that she would be resurrected with Our Lord? Her relatives started making funeral arrangements for Paolina – they saw no hope of her waking from the coma. And there was no possibility of medical intervention. Paolina was a third order Franciscan, and so they made plans to bury her in the brown habit of St Francis. Some of her relatives ran to Padre Pio and asked him if there was any chance of a miracle.

Padre Pio left them and went to celebrate the Easter Vigil. When Padre Pio sang the Gloria and the peal of bells announced Christ's resurrection, Padre Pio's voice choked with sobbing and his eyes

brimmed with tears. At the very instant that Christ was proclaimed resurrected from the dead, Paolina resuscitated. Without anyone lifting a finger to help her, she rose, knelt down and prayed the



Creed three times. When asked what had happened to her after she departed this life, Paolina answered, “I travelled up and up, until I entered into a great light, then I came back.” We may note that the ‘great light’ that Paolina saw was a heavenly glow. But doesn't it seem mysterious that this wife and mother, who had a flaw-

less soul, was struck with sickness and went into a coma before she was ‘resuscitated’? Why would someone with such goodness need to be purified by physical agony? What we do know is that she suffered her painful trials during Lent – and that she suffered simultaneously with Our Lord. Paolina fell into a coma on Good Friday, when Our Lord's scalp was punctured with thorns, and when he hung from the cross. When Our Lord's resurrection was announced by the bells in the church, Paolina woke from her unconsciousness. From that time on, she was well. This miracle is listed in the collections of miracles attributed to Padre Pio for his canonisation process. It has it that Paolina recovered from her coma on Holy Saturday Morning.

Divine Mercy: A Second Chance

During the course of Jesus' revelations to Saint Faustina on the Divine Mercy, He asked on numerous occasions that a feast day be dedicated to the Divine Mercy and that this feast be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. The liturgical texts of that day, the 2nd Sunday of Easter, concern the institution of the Sacrament of Penance, the Tribunal of the Divine Mercy, and are thus already suited to the request of Our Lord. This Feast, which had already been granted to the nation of Poland and been celebrated within Vatican City, was granted to the Universal Church by Pope John Paul II on the occasion of the canonization of Sr. Faustina on 30 April 2000. In





a decree dated 23 May 2000, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments stated that “throughout the world the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday, a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind will experience in the years to come.”

Divine Mercy is intended to be our second chance in our relationship with Jesus; to become a better friend, servant, and reflection of all that Jesus bestows on us. Second chances are given to us by special people. People that see more in us, trust more in us and hope more in us for our developing spiritual growth. Think about some of the second chances you have been given in your life. Some of them were worthy and some of them were not so worthy. But, nevertheless, you were shown mercy. By definition Divine Mercy is a form of God's compassion: an act of grace based on trust or forgiveness. Divine Mercy's purpose is the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial and resurrection.

On page 33 in St. Faustina's diary, she writes about draining boiled potatoes and how difficult it is for her to do this chore. Jesus responds to her, “From today on you will do this easily; I shall strengthen you.” That evening she drained the potatoes easily. As she removed the lid from the pot to let the steam off, she saw in the pot the most beautiful roses beyond description. Jesus said, “I change such hard work of yours into bouquets of the most beautiful flowers, and their perfume rises up to My throne.” That's mercy! As St. Faustina writes in her diary, *Jesus burns with desire to grace us with His Divine Mercy. We just have to ask for our second chance.*

With the liturgical renewal initiated by Vatican Council II, the celebration of the Holy Triduum— Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter— was examined. Pope Pius XII actually began this exercise and in 1951 restored the Easter Vigil to its proper place. The individual liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil are not seen simply as marking isolated events, but really they are seen



together as one saving mystery. For this reason, the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday does not end with a final blessing; rather, that blessing is given at the conclusion of the Easter Vigil.

In his beautiful encyclical [Ecclesia de Eucharistia](#), our beloved Saint Pope John Paul II wrote, "By the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, the Church was born and set out upon the pathways of the world,

yet a decisive moment in her taking shape was certainly the institution of the Eucharist in the Upper room. Her foundation and well-spring is the whole Triduum paschale, but this is as it were gathered up, foreshadowed and 'concentrated' for ever in the gift of the Eucharist. In this gift Jesus Christ entrusted to His church the perennial making-present of the paschal mystery. With it He brought about a mysterious 'oneness in time' between the Triduum and the passage of the centuries."

One could make the argument, therefore, that Lent ends with the celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the beginning of the Triduum; however, one would also be left with a less than forty-day Lent, which contradicts long-standing tradition. So where does that leave us? Perhaps, here is where

tradition carries the greatest weight. As stated above, the Second Vatican Council reminded us to keep the paschal fast throughout Lent until the Easter Vigil, the first Mass of Easter. Nevertheless, we must also celebrate the Triduum really as one saving event which allows us to live in the ever-present reality of our Lord's last supper, passion, death, and resurrection. The Triduum is an even more intense time of preparation for Easter, and brings Lent to its climax.

Buona Pasqua!

"Pupa cu l'ova" means egg in a basket. It is an Italian Easter treat tradition. It represents Holy week and the Resurrection. The cross reminds us of Good Friday. Jesus died for us. The outer shell of the egg represents the tomb where Jesus lays for three days. The egg represents the Resurrection. Jesus gave us new life. Maria Guiseppe (Padre Pio's mother) made pupa cu l'ova always on Good Friday. This tradition was handed down from her mother. On Holy Saturday she presented her prepared Easter meal in a basket to be blessed at St. Mary of the Angels Church. On Easter Sunday, after Holy Mass, she would share this treat with her family and friends.
