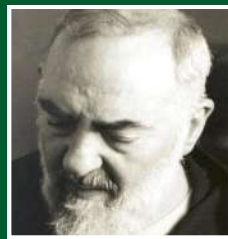

A Plethora of August Feasts

The month of August is dedicated to The Immaculate Heart of Mary. The entire month falls within the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time.

The days of summer have provided a welcome change of pace. However, while vacations afford us the time to relax and refresh, the change of habits and routines can also have a negative impact on our spiritual lives. As if to re-ignite us, the Church offers us in the plethora of August feasts vivid examples of the virtue of perseverance: six martyrs — two who are named in Canon I of the Mass and two who were martyred during World War II; seven founders of religious congregations, as well as three popes and two kings; the apostle, **St. Bartholomew**; the great Doctor of the Church, **St. Augustine** and **St. Monica**, his mother; the humble patron saint of parish priests, **St. John Vianney**, and the patron of deacons and the poor, **St. Lawrence**, who joked with his executioners while being roasted alive.

It is never too late to begin — as the life of the reformed sinner, St. Augustine teaches us — nor too difficult to begin again, as demonstrated by the conversion of the martyr, **St. Teresa Benedicta** (Edith Stein). We present-day members of the Mystical Body are certain of the reward to which we are called, for **Christ's Transfigured body** (August 6) is a preview of that glory. Moreo-

ver, in **The Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary** (August 15), Our Lord has demonstrated his fidelity to his promise. Her privilege is "the highest fruit of the Redemption" and "our consoling assurance of the coming of our final hope — the glorification which is Christ's" (Enchiridion on Indulgences). **The Blessed Virgin Mary** is the most perfect example of Christian perseverance, but she is also our advocate in heaven where she is crowned **Queen of Heaven and Earth** (August 22). Mary is the "**Mother of Perpetual Help**", the patroness of the Congregation founded by **St. Alphonsus Liguori** (August 1). "No one who has fled to her protection is left unaided" is the claim of the Memorare of St. Bernard (August 20). Heretics have returned to the faith by the prayers of her Rosary, first preached by **St. Dominic** (August 8) in the twelfth Century, and hearts have been converted by the graces received while wearing her Miraculous Medal, promoted by St. **Maximilian Kolbe** (August 14) and adopted as the "badge" for the Pious Union he founded.



With Mary Immaculate, let us adore, thank, implore and console the Most Beloved and Sacred Heart of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope!

God Is Aware of Every Tear You Cry

What does the Bible say about our tears? It can often feel that in the darkest of our nights, God is nowhere to be found. When the storm destroys, when our spouse leaves us, when all we

know is loneliness, does God see our tears? Yes. God may have put Psalm 56 in the Bible for people who feel forgotten in their pain. This Psalm says that every tear David has cried, God has placed in a bottle. It's in this intimate imagery that God is near in our hurt. The God of the universe, hearing millions of prayers at any given time, is aware of every tear that leaves your eyes. Psalm 56: 8-11 "You have kept count of my tossing; put my tears in your bottle. In God, whose word I praise, in the Lord, I shall not be afraid." There is not a drop of water that has fallen from your eye that God has



not seen. From the burdens you felt as a 3 year old, to the weights of your teen years. To the anxieties of your young adulthood, to the complexities of old age. Every burden, painful moment, and anxiety you have faced, God is aware of.

WHY DOES GOD REMEMBER OUR TEARS? Have you ever thought about the reason we cry? Why would God create a physical act to coincide with our emotional feelings? One reason may be for the social aspect it provides. Think about how difficult pain is when you are alone in it. Tears communicate to others your need for support and love. So in one way, God's designing of tears was actually a design born from His care for us that tears would symbolize "I'm hurting" to those near us. If they communicate our pain to those around us, how much more to God? Psalm 56 teaches us that God does not simply dismiss our pain. He doesn't acknowledge it and then move on. No, he records them. He keeps a personal record. He is intimate and caring. This is who our God is. How beautiful does this make our God that He is telling us He is aware of every tear we cry? And every tear we suppress because of foolish cultural standards, sinful understanding of masculinity, or the thousands of other reasons we do not allow tears to fall, God is aware of our struggles. He is sympathetic to our pain. He is not withdrawing from our confusion whether it's with sin, anxiety, depression, loneliness, confusion, loss, doubt, or any other type of pain you face. He understands because Jesus felt the burdens we feel. (Hebrews 4:13-16) Wasn't Jesus lonely? Didn't He taste abandonment from God on the cross? Didn't He sense anxiety in the garden when he was sweating blood? Didn't He live day after day with people who doubted who He was, constantly misunderstood? Didn't He weep at the loss of his friend, Lazarus?

A TENDER KING. In God, we do not have a King so lofty and above our difficulties that He sweeps away our tears with disdain. No, we have a King who has descended into the pain with us. You do not cry alone. Jesus understands where you are, more than you realize. May this Psalm be a gentle reminder: your pain is not unseen by the Lord. For now, we have his promises to comfort us. They help us trust in the Lord when it is difficult to see the reasonings and the whys. But soon, we will hear with our own ears and feel on our own faces, the gentle hands of God, wiping away our tears — And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying: "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man, and He will live with them. They will be His people, and God Himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the former things have passed away." And the One seated on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new." (Revelation 21:3-5) Until that day, do not forget that He is aware. He is putting things in motion to show His care for you. And all of this is for sinners, whom He loves.

The Gift of Fortitude

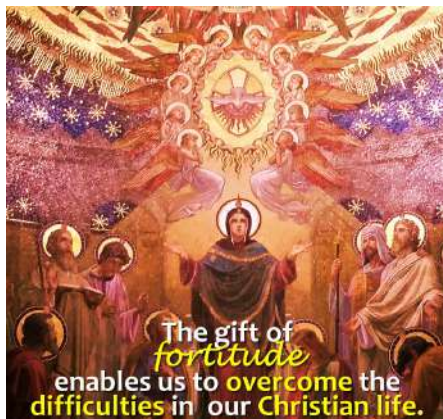
Through the Gift of Fortitude, the Holy Spirit infuses us with supernatural courage when we are at the end of our strength. In our weakness, His strength is made perfect. (2 Cor 12:9) Supernatural Fortitude is founded in the trust that God will work out all things for good for those who love Him. (Rom 8:28)

This Gift of the Holy Spirit flows out of the theological virtue of hope; trust that the promises of the Lord are true, especially His promises of salvation. Hope also extends to trusting God for our everyday needs. So when we turn in trust to the Holy Spirit for strength in times of trial, we are exercising hope and the Gift of Fortitude.

At times we don't feel like we have a lot of courage. Sometime we would rather keep peace than confront others that may be doing something morally wrong in a loving way. While we strongly agree with the moral teachings of the Church, you may not feel like you are a cultural crusader. In fact, you may often find yourself overwhelmed by life. Based on these observations, you might assume that you missed out on the Gift of the Holy Spirit known as Fortitude when you received the sacrament of confirmation. After all, Fortitude, is one of the natural cardinal virtues, is the virtue of moral courage. Do you feel weak in that department? You may actually be in exactly the right position to receive Fortitude as a Gift of the Holy Spirit.

What does the Holy Spirit want to do for you through the Gift of Fortitude? There are a number of ways that we can draw on the strength of the Holy Spirit through this Gift.

- The Holy Spirit can help us to choose what is morally right, even when we find it difficult to do so.
- The Holy Spirit can give us the strength to persevere in our pursuit of what is right and good, even when we're at the end of our strength.
- The Holy Spirit empowers us to stand for the good and the right, even when our courage is stretched beyond the limits of our own natural power.



- With the Holy Spirit's help, we can patiently endure suffering and unite it to the cross of Jesus as an act of love. This practice of uniting our suffering to Christ's is called salvific suffering.
- The Holy Spirit can give us the courage to look within our own hearts and face the evil we find there. He also gives us the courage to conquer our sin and to grow in goodness.
- Finally, don't think of the Gift of Fortitude as a gift you draw upon only in emergencies or dire situations.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to live our Faith in our everyday lives. We can call on the Holy Spirit to help us do so boldly. Fortitude may inspire you to reach out in love to someone who seems lonely.

Maybe it will inspire you to finally extend an olive branch to the person holding a grudge against you. Even the smallest acts of charity take on supernatural significance when they are done with trust and Fortitude.

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit are expressions of actual grace. In other words, they help us to act in ways that strengthen our relationship with God. Trusting God strengthens our relationship with Him. Relying on His strength is one way that we partner with God and participate in the Divine Life. Fortitude helps us overcome sin and evil so we can embrace God's goodness. So, even if you don't feel brave and strong most of the time, pray for the Gift of Fortitude and draw up on the strength of the Lord.

Do You Know Your Parish Priest?

For some of us the interactions with parish priests involve listening to homilies, partaking in the Mass, and shaking their hand as you go out the door leaving Sunday Mass. Here are some suggestions to support your parish priest.

Pray - Pray a daily Rosary for your parish priest and encourage others to pray with you. Contact your priest and let him know that you are supporting him through prayer. Offer your Mass for him.

Live in Unity - Take an active role in your parish community. Attend Mass weekly and become a good steward by offering your gifts of time and talent. Attend parish sponsored events and/or support your parish financially.

Manage Your Expectations - Remember your pastor and parish priests are only human and while they would like to be present to support all parish happenings and family celebrations, this may be impossible. Be accepting of your priests. Recognize their individual gifts to the parish. Help your priests by informing them of illnesses and special needs within your community.

Avoid Gossip - Come to the banquet of the Lord with a positive attitude and avoid negative talk that may only lead to misunderstandings. Be mindful of how you speak about your parish priest with others, especially around children. If you have a disagreement with your parish priest that cannot be resolved through prayer, honestly and respectfully discuss it with him in private.



Appreciate Your Priests - We all need positive encouragement and priests need affirmation too. Tell your priest when you enjoy a homily. Thank him for bringing Jesus to you. Drop him a note or card to thank him for his dedication to the Lord and the Catholic Church.

Make him a dinner or bake him something sweet. Give him a good book to read like "In Sinu Jesu."

Encourage Vocations to the Priesthood and Consecrated Life - Help your priests by praying for an increase of vocations. Teach your children and grandchildren to be open to the Holy Spirit and invite young men and women to consider religious life as a vocation. Encourage and support by volunteering your time with the youth of your parish. Prayerfully support the programs offered by the Office of Vocations. Befriend a priest and your life will be changed.

God put some of the greatest priests to serve as parish priests.

Eternal Father, we lift up all the parish priests of the world. Sanctify them. Heal and guide them. Mold them into the likeness and holiness of your Son, Jesus, the Eternal Priest. May their lives be pleasing to You. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

Padre Pio Spiritual Gifts

As Padre Pio was a humble Capuchin priest, he was the recipient of some of the most astonishing spiritual gifts: the stigmata, bilocation, healing, prophecy, and the ability to read souls. He quickly gained the attention of thousands due to the countless miracles attributed to him. Crowds traveled from all over the world to meet him or to have him hear their Confession. To this day, the stories about his miracles continue to inspire belief in those who were previously skeptical. The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines miracles as “a sign or wonder such as a healing, or control of nature, which can only be attributed to God.” Jesus performed countless miracles—by His own power—throughout His public ministry to demonstrate His divinity and to point us to His Heavenly Kingdom. While reading through stories of Padre Pio’s miracles and spiritual gifts, you may have realized how similar the miracles performed by Padre Pio were compared with those performed by Christ! Of course, the saints do not perform miracles by their own power, but are channels of God’s power. He works through them and through the conformity of their will to His. Still, we can see that Padre Pio and his miracles were a humble reflection of Christ Himself.

Perhaps Padre Pio’s most surprising spiritual gift was the gift of bilocation. Padre Carmelo of Sessano (see photo), who was the superior of Padre Pio’s friary between 1953-1959, tells an



amusing account of one of these occasions: He was with Padre Pio and some other friars attending a show at a concert hall that adjoined the friary. Padre Pio followed along during the show with great interest and enthusiasm. During the intermission, Padre Carmelo recalls seeing Padre Pio leaned forward and rested his head and arms on the back of the chair in front of him, silent and motionless. The friars assumed that he was tired and did not disturb him while he rested in this position for about five minutes. As the intermission ended, Padre Pio sat back up, and spoke with his fellow friars. Padre Carmelo thought nothing of the incident until the next day. He was visiting a sick man in town, and the man thanked Father Carmelo for allowing Padre Pio to visit him the previous evening. Father Carmelo was perplexed. He had been with Padre Pio at the concert hall—and he (Pio) had gone straight back to the friary once the show ended. Pio hadn’t left to visit anyone that evening. When Father Carmelo explained this to the man, he and his entire family continued to insist that Padre Pio had physically been in the house. When Padre Carmelo asked the precise time of this visit, the answer was the exact time of the show’s intermission—during which Padre Pio had appeared to be napping!

When we reflect on Padre Pio’s fascinating life—with its miracles and profound offering of the Sacred Liturgy—let it be an invitation to deeper faith, prayer, and a stronger relationship with the God who loves us. St. Padre Pio, pray for us!
